
Thank you to the whole Kilparrin community for your support during the first half of the term, and welcome back Cathy after what sounds like a fantastic holiday.

This term we welcomed Pre – service teacher Ben Green to our room. He quickly developed a lovely rapport with all the students and staff, and we enjoyed having him in our room. This terms topic was Dinosaurs, which saw us learning about fossils and habitats. During Stem lessons, students became paleontologists and explored a natural discovery box looking for fossils. Their favourite Stem experiment was creating exploding volcanos. In Literacy, students began developing a character profile after engaging in fiction dinosaur stories. This term we took part in 4 wonderful excursions starting with a trip to the Marine Discovery Centre with Room 2 to complete our Sea learning from term 1. We participated in the Variety Zoo Day with Rooms 1 and 2 and then a prehistoric show at the festival theatre with Room 4, which paired well with our Dinosaur topic. Lastly, we attended a whole school excursion as part of the Dream Big shows, where we took part in a movement workshop and a light show. All students had a great time exploring these community activities.



In weeks 3 and 4, the school attended two Dreambig festival events. First at "Earth's Prehistoric", which was an immersive dinosaur show, incorporating puppetry, costume, lights as well as dinosaur roars, nature sounds and music. Props were sent round to audience members and students were able to explore these and get a good sense of what items were being discussed on stage. It was made accessible via interactive segments, an Auslan interpreter and more. Following this, students experienced theatre shows "Erupt" & "Sea of Light". What a wonderful experience for students. The shows were inclusive and engaging. Smiles all round!

In the classroom, we have continued to look at self-portraits in Visual Arts. This term we have focused on the work of Artist Christian Thompson, wearable art, and costume. Students enjoyed choosing materials and making their first wearable art piece. They enjoyed having the photos taken wearing the art they made.

In HASS we continued looking at special places, with a focus on Indigenous special places around South Australia. Students spent time learning Kaurna words for the places we discovered. Students also completed their information posters about their special place and estimated the distances of their special place to school. Students enjoyed finding out whose place is the closest to school.

For English we focused on same and similar sounding words, looking at ending sounds that rhyme. Students enjoyed a range of rhyming games, including the rhyming hat and the online game "Turtle Diary", where students were able to use switches to match rhyming sounds.

We all miss Bjay dearly.






We have had a busy and fun term in Room 5!




Their hard work has transformed our garden into an active learning hub. We can't wait to see (and share) the continued growth of both our students and our garden.

STATEWIDE SUPPORT SERVICE

As part of my role in the Statewide Support Service in the Riverland, Berri Secondary Regional College asked if I would provide a workshop at the Riverland Secondary Schools Alliance Training and Development Day on Friday 9th June. The focus for the Pupil Free Day was 'Guaranteed and Viable Curriculum'. The title of our presentation was 'Empowering and building efficacy, self-determination and self -advocacy in students with disabilities.' To ensure a collaborative approach and to share a breadth of knowledge, I asked Catherine Symonds Kilparrin and Hannah O'Brien SASSVI Advisory Teacher to be a part of the presentation.

Professor Martin Westwell – Chief Executive DfE was the keynote speaker and shared a powerful message about the impact educators have on young people, the importance of public education, the importance of all young people belonging to their school community, the crucial impact Wellbeing has on learning and the importance of building and nurturing learner agency.

As an early intervention teacher in the first instance, Belonging, Being and Becoming (Early Years Learning Framework) are the key factors in early education. It was interesting but not surprising that 'Belonging' is an important focus in secondary schools and really, in life!

Our key points resonated with Professor Westwell's presentation.

Some of our discussions were: Students with disabilities bring their own unique ambitions, needs and challenges and need to feel valued, accepted and acknowledged, with a lens of diversity rather than deficit. Understanding self-determination in the first instance is about promoting dignity and respect. Self-efficacy is to believe in oneself.

It was a wonderful opportunity to network with other educators (SSOs and Teachers) and share the knowledge we have at our sites and hope this is the beginning of a collaborative approach between metropolitan and regional schools – we have so much to share!
