Room 3 also said farewell to Jordan in week 7. It was a wonderful experience for the boys to have a male role model this Term.



The students in Room 5 have started going on weekly excursions to Woolworths at Cumberland Park. This is generally carried out as a Senior Unit and Rooms 4 & 5 students work together to buy ingredients for a cooking session. Throughout the term the students have been buying ingredients to make dips.

Prior to shopping the students are presented with a visual/auditory shopping list so that they

are aware of what is needed to buy. Often each student will have an item that they need to locate once at the shops. Students will then refer back to the list to ensure that they have collected everything they need. To pay for the items, students have been supported to use the self-service check out which involves scanning the items, placing them in a bag and paying by card. This is something the students enjoy being involved in.

As a unit we have been focused on creating dips that we are able to share with others. The two main dips we have made this term are a Basil Pesto and Hummus. By creating the dips a few times students are able to really understand the procedure required to make the dip. During literacy sessions the students have also been learning about procedure writing and understanding a recipe.

The students in the Senior Unit are really enjoying these shopping and cooking sessions and especially sharing the dips with their families!













new things, immersing ourselves in learning experiences and challenging ourselves to extend our understandings.

Supporting the development of social competence has been a major focus this term. More specifically, we have looked closely at how we can regulate and express our emotions in order to build and nurture relationships. During this time, we have made it our mission to talk about emotions throughout the day, every day. To do this, we have read stories; modelled and labelled our own emotions, as well as those of others; provided concrete strategies that help support the KELC children to address and express emotions appropriately (for example, using the PODD to talk about difficult emotions like anger or sadness); sung various songs (for example, 'If You're Happy and You Know It'); and encouraged the KELC children to communicate how they are feeling throughout the day.

Other highlights this term have included

- -Our science experiment in the garden
- -Getting messy during sensory play
- -Having opportunities to explore different food during cooking
- -Our exciting incursions (for example, exploring Robots in the music room)
- -Continuing to access different learning environments such as the library and the gym

Later in the term, students have been creating music out of milk bottles. We have created our own train soundscape, using the trainset as the conductor of our milk bottle orchestra as a form of tactile graphic notation. Playing music when the train goes along the track, speeding up as it goes down the hill and slowing down as it goes up the hill, of course as it gets to a stop sign or a boom gate we stop playing. We have been amazed at how our recordings of our train compositions sound just like a train!

Keep up the good work in music Kilparrin students!









STEM SCIENCE, TECHNOLOGY, ENGINEERING & MATHS

Hi Families,

What a busy term we have had in STEM learning across our school community.

In week 4 we were lucky to have Jeff from the Student Robotics Club of SA who compete internationally as, RoboRoos. He brought in 3 different self-built robots from his collection. They were set up for our students to play FIRST Tech Challenge games. Students had access via a game pad and toggle that was manoeuvrable by a slight touch of the hand or fingers. The robots were lots of fun and made noises as they moved about. Students were so excited to watch and feel them move and looked so proud knowing they were controlling the robots on the challenge. We are so grateful to Jeff for sharing these fabulous robots with our school community. As we wrapped up our unit on coding and robotics we begun to prepare for our term 3 focus around Science Week with the theme of Food: Different by Design. Our focus will be on dairy farming and how dairy foods are produced. As a lovely compliment to this learning, we had the Farm Barn join us at the start of our term, many of you would have seen pictures in our last newsletter. In addition to this we have been selected as one of the few schools in SA to decorate and keep a Picasso Cow. It arrived on Thursday of week 8. 
