When we explore using our senses, we are developing the tools to use our senses effectively and efficiently in the world around us. Welcome back to a busy exciting year for 2024. This year Samuel has moved up to join us in room 3. All students have been quick to adjust comfortably back into school and class routines.

This term we have a big focus on tactile and braille experiences spanning across many of our subject areas. We have been engaging in learning activities around 'The Olympics' – past and present. We have begun exploring a tactile map of the world, recording, and marking what countries/cities have hosted the Olympics from ancient Greece to this year's Paris. We have listened to some of the cultural songs played in the opening ceremonies. This was a favourite with everyone. In one of our lessons, we created our own Olympic torch with a variety of different textured materials in the flame colours. We will continue by learning about the games and sports that athletes compete in and compare modern sports to the ones in ancient times.

For Literacy we have been working hard focusing on sounds, letters and words including tactile and braille representations. With support, each student is creating their own personalised alphabet book. Students have chosen words from their worlds to represent the focus letter of the week and made a touch friendly picture to illustrate their word which has been labelled with braille. They have contributed some great words and the books are already looking amazing. Our focus book has been 'The Terrible Plop' and with this story we have been working on our comprehension and memory skills. Following the interest of students, we have also been learning about the animal characters in the story, and writing something we learnt about the animal.

Students have all worked hard and we hope they enjoy a well-earned holiday break.


